TONY DESARE & THE AMERICAN SONGBOOK

Tony DeSare is a New Yorker by birth, but an Italian at heart. The *New York Times* has described him as "two parts Sinatra and one part Billy Joel." USA Today says "DeSare covers old and newer pop and jazz standards without smothering or over-thinking the material."

Singer/pianist DeSare plays at some of *the* most prestigious jazz venues in the U.S., including 54 Below and Birdland in New York City and Feinstein's on both coasts. And he performs with symphony orchestras around the country.

The OregonTuscans have a block of tickets for his Oct. 20, 3pm concert with the Oregon Symphony Pops. You can buy your seats at the Oct. 6 meeting. Tickets are \$33 each if you're up-to-date on your dues.

La Lettera Toscana is not normally known for its sports coverage, but this month we'll make an exception. Back in August, Oregon City's Stone Creek Golf Course hosted the U.S. national championship for blind golfers, which attracted players from around the world.

Three cheers to a pair of Milanese who won their respective brackets. Andrea Calcaterra won the men's bracket for the most profoundly blind participants. Chiara Giocosa won the women's division.

OregonTuscan Gino Pieretti got to follow Chiara as she made her way around the course during the first

round of the two-day tournament. Gino acted as her local greeter/interpreter at the request of his neighbor, Ron Plath, who was running the event.

"I went with Chiara and her coach to the driving range. *Whack!* Beautiful drives, right down the middle, 210 yards," Gino recalled. On the practice green "her coach sets the clubhead against the ball. Then she drains three out of five! I had more fun watching her play than I would have had watching Tiger Woods play Arnold Palmer!"

The trip started with the Oregon Arts Orchestra performing concerts in spectacular venues in Rome, Montecatini and Treviso. (I'll have more to say about the orchestra in November.) We took a side-trip to Cremona, where we visited a violin maker. It was here that I spotted one of my Italian surnames on a sign—violin maker Adriano Spadoni. My maternal grandmother was Nice Spadoni.

From the music trip, we went on to Como at the foot of Lake Como. I had always heard that my paternal grandmother came from there, and sure enough, here was the second sighting, her name on the marquee of a store in Como. Maria Trombetta was my paternal grandmother.

Then on to Piedmont for a hiking, drinking and eating tour in the homeland of my paternal grandfather. So I continued the search, now for "Perino." No luck, but I did get close (for example, Perno) on a number of signs. No sighting at all of my maternal grandfather's name, Santoni. But "almost three" out of four ain't bad!

The Piedmont part of the trip was a way to connect with my father's side—the NON-TUSCAN side! And although Piedmont was lovely, with beautiful scenery, delicious wine and food, it just isn't Tuscany. That's what I kept thinking throughout my time there—it's nice, but it's just not Tuscany.

So I guess we should all be grateful that we are somehow connected (whether by heritage, marriage, interest or our club) to the beautiful province of Tuscany, with its art, architecture, scenery, wineries and food. And that's what we try to do at every meeting of the Tuscan Association of Oregon—celebrate Tuscany's riches. I hope you will continue to join us this new club year so we can together continue to do just that!
