- He was born in Lajalica, a rural Tuscan farming town about 20 miles from Pisa, in 1958.
- He was born with glaucoma. He lost all sight at age 12 because of a brain hemorrage stemming from a soccer injury.
- At age 6 he memorized his favorite opera, *La Boheme*.
- His goal in life was to be a singer, but after graduating from the University of Pisa, he enrolled in law school when he was 27, to satisfy his father. He worked as a lawyer for a year, but then quit, deciding to follow his destiny, to become a successful professional singer.
- He got his first big break in 1992 when he recorded the Italian

popular song *Miserere* with the Italian rock star Zucchero Fornaciari. Two years later he took first prize at the San Remo Music Festival. He continued his opera studies with teachers of Maria Calas and Luciano Pavarotti.


- He's sung in 30 countries and in six languages.
- His success has led to the creation of a foundation to fund research at MIT to develop methods and equipment to help the blind with their daily activities. His foundation also provides financial support to the people, and especially the children, of Haiti.

By now I'm sure you've determined that our mystery singer is Andrea Bocelli. At our meeting on Feb. 19 we'll watch a DVD of his 2015 PBS *Great Performances* concert with an orchestra in Los Angeles. The concert focuses on music by both American and Italian film composers, including Irving

Berlin, Ennio Morricone, Giovanni Rota, Henry Mancini and Leonard Bernstein. (Here's *Maria* from West Side Story.) Bocelli sings in both Italian and English.

If you had attended the Los Angeles concert it would have easily cost you \$50 for a ticket. Come to Carvlin Hall on Feb. 19 instead, where you will have a *free* front row seat at a concert by one of the world's most popular singers of

opera, classical and popular music – with refreshments, no less! And bring a friend. You'll be glad you did!





THREE ITALIAN MOVIES INCLUDED IN 40TH PORTLAND INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL

The weather stinks ... still. Forget the flu - you're dealing with multiple bouts of cabin fever this winter. What are you gonna do?

INDIVISIBIL

Well, wait for a break in the storms sometime in the next two weeks, then head out for a foreign film ... particularly an Italian one.

The 40th Portland International Film Festival begins on Feb. 9 and, right out of the box (or film can) come a trio of Italian movies. One is a contemporary fairy tale, another a female buddy movie along the lines of *Thelma and Louise*, and the last a movie for our times: a documentary about refugees near Sicily.

Indivisibili (Indivisible) stars actresses who, in real life, are identical twins. In the film, they are, literally, joined at the hip. Their conjoined status and their ability to sing make them bankable – and keeps them under the thumb of their parents. But the story turns once they learn they can be safely separated. Here is the trailer.

Variety, which liked the film, says it has "the feel of updated folklore – a Brothers Grimm classic, perhaps [which] despite its neo-gothic trappings ... is at heart warm and accessible."

Indivisible plays on the evenings of Feb. 10 & Feb. 12.

FUOCOAMMARE

Loco Alegria (Like Crazy) is a tale of two psychiatric

patients on the run. Their odyssey starts out by chance when their work van is late, but their escape "turns the remainder of the film into an exploration of what

> happiness is, how it can be found and what it really means to be 'crazy,'" according to <u>The Hollywood</u> <u>Reporter</u>. Here's a <u>clip</u>.

Like Crazy will be screened on the evenings of Feb. 11 & Feb. 13.

Fuocoammare (Fire at Sea) looks at the Italian island of Lampedusa, which is actually closer to Tunisia than Sicily. It is a spare, rocky place, much like the documentary itself.

Fire at Sea looks at life on Lampedusa for those who live there freely as well as for the refugees who risk death trying to reach it. A series of real-life character studies and vignettes, the film avoids narration, a sound track and a do-gooder point-of-view.

The <u>New York Times</u> has written that "Fire at Sea is impressionistic and intensely absorbing ... it compels you to

infer a big picture from a series of extended, intimate scenes." You can see the trailer here.

Fire at Sea plays on Sunday morning Feb. 12 & on the evening of Feb. 15.

There are dozens of films at the festival, representing 58 countries, ranging from Croatia to Cuba and South Africa to South Korea. All films are subtitled or in English.
