Bill Galbreath passed away on Sep. 13 after a short illness. He was 87.


Jim Lamano died in late October at age 94.

After a stint in the U.S. Army, Bill graduated from Willamette University, where he earned both his undergraduate and law degrees. He practiced law in Milton-Freewater in eastern Oregon for over two decades before returning to the Portland area in the 1980s. Bill was an excellent cook, a gentleman farmer and a lover of fine wine and good conversation.
